Titov has logged more than 387 days in space, including 18 hours and 48 minutes of Extravehicular Activity (EVA).

Titov has also served as pilot-instructor and flight commander for cosmonaut flight training. He has logged more than 1,400 hours flying time and holds qualifications as a military and test pilot.
